In 1939 the chapter unveiled another marker, one and one-half miles east of North Pleasureville. On the bronze tablet is the following inscription: "This site marks the religious and civic center of the Low Dutch Colony which purchased 6,800 acres from Squire Boone in 1786 to become the home of thirty-four families. Erected by the Bland Ballard Chapter, D.A.R." On this occasion the guest speaker was Hon. Walter B. Smith, who later married one of the chapter members, Mrs. O'Brien.

In the fall of 1943 great excitement prevailed among the members when it was learned that the above tablet was missing.

Diligent search was made but to no avail, so a new tablet was finally secured. Shortly afterward the lost tablet was found in a junk heap at Frankfort.

J. E. Johnston secured the old millstones for the chapter to mark the site. These stones had belonged to his father, Captain I. N. Johnston. When the new tablet was placed Mr. Johnston read the following original poem:

Today, we meet because some man,
 With sordid selfish soul,
 Did take the marker, we had planned—
 To us a sacred scroll—
 And now we're here to dedicate
 Another of same mold.

And if another pilfering hand
 Should take this one away
 Let's show the Low Dutch spirit brand
 And put it back to stay;
 With resolution that a plaque
 Shall mark this spot away.

If we could roll the scroll of time
 Back through the long, long years
 To those old days when the sun did shine
 On Low Dutch smiles and tears,
 What would we find on this sacred spot
 Which marked their hopes and fears?

Upon this sloping, hallowed site
 Old Six Mile Church House stood,
 A helpful, welcome, beacon light
 For all the neighborhood;
 A place to offer fervent thanks
 To the Giver of all good.

'Twas here they sought the Master's rule
 To reach their highest goal
 By worthy acts in life's hard school
 Which needed His control;
 Here they came each Sabbath day
